# Greenville Avenue old-timers

For decades people have been attracted to the Greenville Avenue area by its neighborhood feel: the distinct architecture and historical value of the homes, the large trees, and the shops clustered along the avenue, so distinct from the typical suburban segregation of homes and shopping center. Many of the shops remain, and with them, much of the original interest and texture they have always lent the neighborhood.

As with all vital things, the new emerges as the established continue to prosper. Several new businesses along Lower Greenville, among them, Corner Market and Floyd's Barbershop, are only a few months old. While other places, having already set the gold standard in their respective fields, are celebrating silver-plus anniversaries in October: The Ole Moon, 28 years, The Grape, 34 years. Moreno Printing moved to their present location in 1972. Other long-time merchants are Nick's Café, Whole Foods, and Frank's Keys.

As divergent in age and category as these businesses are, they share more than they diverge. Most of the owners and principals and many employees reside in the Lower Greenville area. They all derive the majority of their customers from our neighborhood. And appreciating the importance of customer loyalty, these merchants and entrepreneurs all give back to our community in a variety of ways.

The Grape lends monetary support to the contiguous neighborhood associations, to local schools, and civic concerns. Moreno Printing, donating their expertise to Stampede Dallas, helps raise funding for Children's Medical Center. The Ole Moon, Corner Market, and Floyd's Barbershop, all support a broad collection of local schools, churches, and neighborhood initiatives.

If one reaps what one sows, then Lower Greenville residents should feel that they reside in a fertile field, indeed. We are all in walking or cycling distance to many businesses, all offering goods and services used on a continuing basis. They are right here. For us.

# Another hazardous chemical collection

Kudos to the many residents who brought hazardous household chemicals for disposal at LGNA's September meeting. The response was so positive that we had to turn away some folks because the truck was filled.

To accommodate everyone, LGNA will again accept materials for disposal at the November meeting – oil filters, used motor oil, antifreeze, batteries, paint products, and yard chemicals. Materials will be taken to the county's Home Chemical Collection Center. HC3 does not accept business/medical

waste, electronics, explosive/shocksensitive materials, containers larger than five (5) gallons, smoke detectors or other radioactive materials, and common recyclables (plastic, glass, aluminium).

We will be accepting home chemicals from 6:45 p.m. to 8.00 p.m. in the church parking lot on November 21 only. Please do not bring items inside the church or leave items at any other time.

The HC3, located at 11234 Plano Road, has extended hours on Tuesdays and is open on two Saturdays per month if you are not able to attend on November 21.

### Marathon alert

The White Rock Marathon benefiting Scottish Rite hospital will be held on Sunday, December 10, and will impact the Lower Greenville neighborhood.

The race starts at American Airlines Center at 8 a.m. The fastest runners will cross Greenville at approximately 8:30 a.m. The courses involve Greenville, Matilda, Skillman, Martel, Ellsworth, Belmont, and Richmond.

The course for the full marathon runs along Greenville to Ellsworth through the Lakewood neighborhood to the lake. The half-marathoners run up Greenville to Martel, south on Matilda to Belmont and Richmond, then south on Skillman to Swiss Avenue. Traffic will be affected in our neighborhood for most of the morning. Allow extra time if you're out and about.

### Graffiti abatement

The City of Dallas organized a graffiti wipe-out event on October 14. A large portion of East Dallas, including the Lower Greenville area, was targeted. Members of the Lower Greenville Crime Watch joined with city staff, City Councilmember Angela Hunt, and other volunteers to abate about 50 sites along public and private property.

The city divided volunteers into teams of 5 or 6 and provided each team with a list of five sites to abate. They provided all supplies and even served lunch afterward.

To quote one volunteer, "As we drove around with paint brushes in hand, we could not help but notice the overwhelming amount of graffiti in the area." Although the teams made a good dent, it's up to all of us to keep our neighborhood free of graffiti. When it's removed promptly, it's far less likely to come back.

Councilmember Hunt has worked to include a graffiti-abatement plan in the new city budget. The new program would provide a city crew to clean up graffiti on private property.

Before, if a vandal spray-painted graffiti on private property, the property owner might get a notice from the city telling them to clean up the graffiti or be fined. With the new program, the property owner would have the option of the city's cleaning up the graffiti for no charge. For more information, visit Councilmember Hunt's site, www.AngelaHunt.com.
