## CITY COUNCIL ELECTIONS

Elections for City Council are scheduled to take place on **Saturday**, **May 11**. Dallas is divided into 14 districts, each district represented by a City Councilmember. Councilmembers are elected for a period of two years with a limit of four consecutive terms or eight years.

The LGNA area has been ably represented for eight years by District 14 Councilmember Angela Hunt. Ms Hunt has consistently worked with neighborhood associations, crime watches, and other citizen groups to maintain and improve conditions for our residents. Under the City's term limits, she will be stepping down in 2013, having served four consecutive terms.

The horseshoe-shaped District 14 wraps from Lower Greenville and the M Streets to the Arts District, downtown, and parts of Love Field. Mirroring the shape and adjacent to the south of District 14 is District 2 which has been represented by Pauline Medrano for eight years. She has often worked in tandem with Councilmember Hunt to improve our neighborhoods. Ms Medrano is also term limited and will be stepping down.

In a repeat of 2011's successful "Meet the Candidates" forum sponsored by nine area neighborhood associations, LGNA is co-sponsoring a Town Hall with District 2 and District 14 candidates. The event is scheduled for late March or early April, and several candidates from Districts 2 and 14 have already expressed an interest in participating.

One candidate for Angela Hunt's replacement is longtime LGNA board member Philip Kingston. Philip has been actively involved in LGNA activities and interaction with the City; however, he's resigned his LGNA post in order to devote time to his campaign.

Our thanks to Philip Kingston for his services to LGNA and our neighborhood.

#### GARDENING TIPS FROM SARA.

January gardening and yard suggestions from neighborhood gardener Sara Wick.

- Remember that hydrangea blooms on last year's wood, so do NOT trim to the ground.
- Be careful not to catch snowflakes on your tongue until all birds have flown South for the winter.
- Put out finch feeders now with thistle (nyjer) seed. Keep the seed fresh, and you will enjoy feeding these colorful birds until spring.

## CRIME WATCH UPDATE

## Keep Your Eyes Open darren dattalo, crime watch coordinator

Although the overall crime numbers were very good the last few months, there were a couple of recent incidents worth mentioning. An LGNA resident was severely beaten by an unknown assailant on Lowest Greenville. Police worked very hard on

this one, and a suspect was arrested.

In another incident, a driveway robbery occurred on Lewis Street in November. Two males robbed a man at gunpoint at around 7:45pm as he was going to his car. A female companion saw the men approaching and quickly went into the house, thinking they looked suspicious. She was right. No one was hurt, but this is a good lesson in trusting your instincts and avoiding dangerous situations.

Although the number of car break-ins is down right now, be aware that we have some tire/wheel thefts in the area. This follows a short

series of third-row SUV seats being stolen. While these are likely different sets of thieves, they probably come back because of the high number of vehicles parked in the street. Remove valuables from sight and lock up!

#### THIEVES ON THE PROWL FOR HOLIDAY GIFTS

Thieves celebrate their Christmas gifting in the weeks following December 25. They can spot your presents without ever stepping foot in your house, especially when your trash sits on the curb. Here is some advice for disposing of wrapping paper or boxes for TVs, electronic games, expensive jewelry or bikes.

It's best to tear up the boxes in the house. If you have garbage bags, stuff the pieces inside or tear up the pieces and put them inside your recycling bin. A few extra minutes with a box cutter is time well spent. If at no other time of the year, please observe the bulk trash rules for January 2013 and don't put out the bulk items early.

This time of year thieves reap the added benefit of knowing which iPad, TV, or tool will bring them the greatest reward since your trash can serves as very effective advertising. If you plan on using the winter months to get organized, clean out the garage, etc., plan a stop at one of the many recycling facilities before your bulk trash week. While especially true during the holiday season, remember to practice safe trash disposal also when you're

celebrating birthdays, graduations, anniversaries, etc.

On a related topic, please do not post to social media when you are away from home. Burglars leverage social media and may go shopping at your home.

Several LGNA residents have told me that because crime trends are improving, they didn't see the need to take the precautions that Darren and I recommend. Please keep in mind that the crime stats may not reflect true numbers because many victims don't take the time to file a police report or are too embarrassed to call 911. Also remember that if you don't take precautions, the bad guys will take advantage of the easier pickings.

The insurance companies compile statistics as well, and those numbers have been increasing. Sadly most victims are surprised that without specified replacement coverage, there is little hope of replacing the new laptop and the new TV and the new tablet.

I hope the New Year is prosperous and peaceful for each of you. Take care.
